

- Review of nationally prepared documents




Partnership with municipalities: Ukraine NAS

- Climate Change Adaptation Working Group (CCA WG) established to work on the National Adaptation Strategy of Ukraine by 2030 development (150+ members, including CoM East) – 9 meetings conducted
- Defines key risks for national security, caused by climate change
- Describes known risks and vulnerabilities to climate change for 10 sectors and natural components (coastal zones, biodiversity, water resources, health care, energy, forestry, cities and public communities, fisheries, hazards risks, agriculture and soils, transport and infrastructure), tourism)
- Names key cross-sectoral problems to be addressed, and relevant tasks, ways and means of addressing them
- Describes monitoring, control and organizational support for the Strategy implementation
- Draft NAS published in March 2021
- Regional Adaptation planning workshop with focus on urban adaptation March 2021
- Planned for 2021: recommendations for sectoral adaptation plans: energy, healthcare, water, transport, construction and infrastructure – with active involvement of CoM East
