- Improved balance between Oslo and the rest of the region





Responibilities


- National government: Rail transport and international roads, logistics centers for rail transport
- Counties: Other public transport (Bus, boats, subway, tram), guidelines for land use
- Municipalites: Spatial planning

Need for coordination in a high populated area with many municipalities and several counties.




Strategy for transport, land use, 2007

- First strategy. Innovative in it's approach to integrate transport and land use.
- Was the basis for a formal plan for land use and transport initiated by the National government for Oslo and Akershus County.
- Aim to support city delevopment in the region and an effective transport system linking them together – a polycentric region.
- Sets out principles to stop city sprawl, conserve forest and farmland.
- Points to the need for the strengthening of rail transport




Improved transport system in combination with development of cities outside Oslo





City development

- Compact and full range of services
- «15 minute City» short distances
- Different functions located in the right spot, including public owned fascilities.



Nature, fjord and forrest

- Green areas, farm land, beach areas.
- Balancing of growth and development
- Public access to forrests, lakes and the fjord
- Compact cities and zero emmisson solutions



Joint strategy for goods and logistics, 2012


- Strategy for logistics and the transport of goods
- Intitiated a «hub satelite» plan for concentrating logistics terminals with road and rail access in Oslo as well as to the north and south of Oslo.
- Road connections around Oslo
- Uderlines the challenges in the handling of growing amounts of importes goods, especially from Europe.


Joint strategiens for transport, land use and logistics, 2016

- Revised strategy for spatial planning and land use.
- Ammendments to the 2007 version:
 - Larger area (the Oslo Region Alliance had grown geographically)
 - More emphasis on the environment and climate issues
 - Zero-growth aim for personal car transport all growth should be handled by walking, biking and public transport
 - More emphasis on cross border transport connections to Stockholm, Copenhagen and the European continent.



Status report goods and logistics, 2020

- Status report about logistics and the transport of goods in the Oslo Region
- Basis for national and nordic efforts to strenghten transport of goods by sea and rail.
- Point to growing congestions in the logistics system, more than 20 % growth ind raod transport of goods since 2012.
- Few improvements since 2012 in terminal structure

The Oslo Region's propasals for the national government now

- More than 50 % of CO2 emmisions from the transport sector in Norway comes from transport in the Oslo Region -Important that the national government invests in transport infrastucture here.
- 80 % og inported goods in Norway land in the Oslo Region. Roads are nearing full capacity
- Rail transport must have capacity and efficiency
- Support for international rail links

Mayor's declaration on Climate and Environment

- February 2019 1st version of declaration was signed in Oslo City Hall - Oslo European Green Capital
- June 2022 renewed declaration with a stronger focus on the urgent climate and nature crises
- 54 mayors have confirmed their support on the declaration



Oslo Region Climate Academy

- Knowledge-development and sharing of experience between municipalities and other actors

- October 27th: Sustainable Forestry in the Oslo region

Energy Stations – Green Freight Transport

- 1/3 of climate emissions on transport from heavy vehicles in Eastern Norway (2020)
- National goal 50% reduction on transport emissions in 2030
- Municipalities and counties important as governments on planning, climate, business development
- Project 2022-2024:
 - Identifying areas for energy stations on zero emissions
 - Development of common guidelines on spatial planning and development om energy stations



Mission Oslofjord – critical ecology status

- The Oslofjord is put under extreme pressure and there is a real concern that the ecosystem will collapse
- Main pollution sources:
 - Emission of waste water lack of efficiency in waste water treatment plants
 - Runoff from agriculture
- Municipalities important stakeholders as local governments
- Project on contributing, knowledge sharing on improving the environmental situation






European Green Capital 2019 (EGC)








The main challenges in reaching the 2030-target
